A Month in Postcards

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This month our postcard warriors from Australia sent 391 cards and from Canada sent 1,384 cards. Australia's total sent is now 20,607 cards and Canada's is now 8,658.

Please keep the cards coming; the Defenders will treasure them!

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About

Postcards to the Front International Newsletter is a monthly publication of the project Postcards to the Front. Founded by three Ukrainian women shortly after Russia's February 2022 invasion of Ukraine, the idea of sending messages of support and encouragement to the frontline Defenders of Ukraine spread out on Postcrossing.com—an international postcard exchange platform. Branches of Postcards to the Front have been established in Australia and Canada.

Defender personnel, including medics, mechanics, drivers, cooks, etc., receive postcards in their care packages. While each bit of happy mail makes a huge difference in the psychological well-being of the front line Defenders, messages and pictures from children are especially heartwarming. Your support makes a difference. Thank you!

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Editorial

This month we begin with two reminders about why your postcards matter.

First, as we all know, Ukraine has resisted terror from the Russian aggressor for more than three years, demonstrating inspirational courage and resilience amongst Ukrainians to stand for freedom and democracy. This map represents one way to consider how to 'name' courage.



Second, we don't get a lot of feedback about the postcards that travel to the front lines from all over the world through this project. But when we do, we like to share it because it is for *you*, dear postcard warriors. For example, each month we share images of Defenders receiving your cards [see later in the newsletter]. These images often generate some joy from senders who recognize their card in a box full of supplies, or in the hands of a Defender. Earlier this year, we received a video note of thanks from a Defender, which you can view here.



This month, we are happy to share with you a message of awe and thanks from a volunteer in Nikopol region who distributes the cards to the front lines. Click on this YouTube video (2 min) to learn more.

The volunteer speaks in Ukrainian, but ... you can see what she says by clicking on the CC [closed caption] setting at the bottom of the video frame to generate English subtitles. You can hear her emotion, in her voice, and through her words, as she describes how she feels as she reads each postcard, and admits, "... I could not hold back my tears ... and I think that they [Defenders] will be a thousand times more pleased to read your wishes ..."

Your cards matter. They make a difference in the lives of Ukrainians.

Interview Angela, Ottawa

Meet Angela. She's a child of the Oshawa, Ontario Ukrainian community. And, she's an Ottawa warrior, who has made it a mission to participate a few times each week in the daily demonstrations held at "the russian embassy of war crimes" since Russia's full scale invasion of Ukraine in February 2022.





That's not all! When Angela learned about *Postcards to the Front* in early 2024, she began to organize monthly postcardwriting cafes with the russian embassy protesters (rep), who count in their numbers quite a few regulars as well as anyone who wishes to join them.

The group has written a few hundred amazing postcards on their own original designs, unique to their mission to educate those who pass by the Russian Embassy about their crimes against Ukraine.

When asked, why write postcards, Angela explained:

"First, it's a powerfully direct way to contribute without much money. I know many people - myself included - who wish they could help Ukraine more directly, and feel useless, so far away. We love donating to Ukrainian volunteers who buy supplies for units – drones, night vision scopes, supply trucks, etc. The frontline connection is powerful, but I only have so much money to donate. Sometimes, the unit sends back a signed flag with messages of

thanks from Defenders. It gives me goosebumps and determination. I feel part of a big team fighting for good. I wanted the chance to send *that* feeling to the frontline."

"Secondly, I thought it could help fight the burnout and apathy that comes from a long war. Going to protests can get repetitive/boring. Listening to the tragic news every day is hard. I thought it was a lighter, feel-good way to keep people emotionally invested and making an impact. Maybe even activate more sympathizers. I tried it and others agreed. Writing postcards over a glass of wine and snacks with friends can be fun. It does indeed bring in people who can't attend our protests. Some of our members host their own sessions with people they know. The concept spreads."

"Because war is more than numbers and equipment. It's people with feelings who must choose between fighting and surrender every minute, every day. Our postcards connect to that human element. Those who have never fought don't how hard it is to turn equipment into results; we can slip into abstract geopolitics. I have heard that defenders feel alone or forgotten. With postcards we remind them we care about them, value their work, and support them."



"Through the protest group, I have learned how much this message means coming from outside Ukraine. Ukrainians tell us so online and in person, it means so much to them that the world still cares."

When asked about the first postcard, laying on the table, waiting for her to write a message to an unknown Defender, Angela, like other postcard warriors, admitted that she found it incredibly intimidating.

"How could I know what words a Defender needs to hear? But I told myself that I can just throw out a postcard if I hate it. Just jump in the pool. I started by writing about myself and the things I do to support Ukraine – things I know. I never ended up throwing any out, but I found I kept getting ideas for how they could be better. I'd just start a new card. Taking the pressure off made it easier to experiment. I found tricks for filling up space and reducing the need for text: big lettering, stickers, simple drawings. I also fill up space with quotes from the Ukrainian anthem, or famous Canadians (ex: Terry Fox, Jack Layton)."

"Finally, I did what made me feel good. I found that expressing my care and drawing tryzubs, Ukrainians flags, hearts, etc., is a light, heartwarming activity. I find crafting therapeutic, so now doing postcards is part of my stress relief toolkit. When I've become too anxious from reading war news — will we have enough shells? — I draw on some postcards and add text later. Connecting to a positive emotion helps me process my fear so I don't burn out."

Angela reminds our readers that "the <u>tips page</u> on the website is really helpful! I didn't use the Ukrainian phrases much at first, because I speak some Ukrainian, and wanted to practice my writing / personalize my message. But such cards are difficult, take a long time to write, and I wanted to reach more Defenders. I thought, maybe they just need a simple, bright, positive message? Maybe it's more important to just make more cards? I embraced the phrases with simple drawings. The most helpful was looking at other people's postcards from the *Postcards to the Front* website / emails and at those written by others at our workshops. They gave me ideas and showed a wide range of styles. Now I do a mix of longer, personal cards and simpler, bright cards with the more general phrases."

Angela acknowledges the commitment of those who protest daily at the Russian Embassy, as "a group of wonderful people ... we know this [protests] won't end the war, but it shows the Russians and fellow Canadians that we aren't giving up our values. Ukraine's bravery should inspire us all to keep resisting evil, however we can. We use a lot of props and art, but usually, we just hang out on the sidewalk with flags, snacks, signs, chalk, memes for the [hydro] pole. We especially love to troll the staff with cheeky humour, like when we held a sham referendum to annex the russian embassy on Putin's birthday (106% voted yes!). Tyrants hate to be mocked. Every night, the staff wash our chalk drawings off the sidewalk and pull down the posters we put on the telephone pole. I didn't expect it to have

There is also a powerful camaraderie amongst the rep group members. For example, "for each other's birthdays, we all chip in for a donation to Ukraine. We love donating for drones, often through United24, where you can donate directly to the Ukrainian government for a variety of humanitarian and defense projects. Our first birthday fundraiser went to the development of naval drones – and now we see they have pushed Russia's navy out of the Black Sea! We also donate to <u>Save</u> <u>Ukraine</u>, which rescues and supports Ukrainian children abducted by Russia. Using birthdays and holidays to fundraise is an easy way to help."

much impact — it was also something therapeutic to do with little money. But Ukrainians and our neighbours told us we boost their morale. Our referendum made the news in Ukraine! Most surprisingly, federal politicians have told us that they bring up the continuing protests across Canada when their colleagues question whether to keep sending aid to Ukraine. They tell us to keep it up because leaders need to SEE support. I never expected something so small (and fun) could have such a big impact."

Knowing that many Canadians care about Ukraine, and also aware that individual resources have limits, Angela suggests that "people to make your contribution manageable for your schedule and resources. Do a little, regularly, so you can keep doing it. Most of us protesters just happen to live near the embassy – it doesn't take us much time. Through Toonie Tuesday on X & bluesky, you can give just 2\$ to a different Ukrainian organization

each week. If you don't have much money, use your actions. Write postcards [you can get some FREE from Postcards to the Front], write your MP to tell them to support Ukraine, hang a Ukrainian flag on your house. One of our members does a weekly videochat with a Ukrainian to help them practice their conversational English skills (via ENGin – no experience required!). Never think your contribution is too small to matter. *Don't think about what you can't do – focus on what you can do*. Look at how Ukraine is taking on Goliath by making the most out of their very limited resources, and drawing on a vast network of civilians, like us, who are pitching in what we can to the effort."

We are reminded of anthropologist Margaret Mead who said, "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world; indeed, it's the only thing that ever has."

When thinking about postcard messages, Angela thinks about how much she "loves getting handwritten notes and thank you cards. I think of one note I received, in particular, many years ago. At the beginning of grad school, my father passed away. It was an incredibly dark and lonely time; I was barely getting out of bed. One day I discovered a card in my bag when I got home. It was a heartfelt note of condolence from one of my new classmates — a total stranger. She said she had no idea what I was going through, but she would help however she could, cheerfully offering to be my 'new stranger-friend'. I was so moved that a stranger would do such a thing. Her positive emotion boosted my energy. I hope I can give a defender that feeling. Caring humans — even if strangers — connected through empathy will surely overcome the hateful selfish goons hiding in the Kremlin while robbing their people. *Love is more powerful than hate*."

How do we move forward, to support Ukraine, in 2025 when there is so much chaos on the planet?

"With Donald Trump befriending Putin, Defenders need our messages now more than ever. Ukrainians are scared that they are being abandoned. We need to show them that the rest of the free world isn't following the Cheeto in the White House. Make your postcard with whatever skills / supplies you have, don't set yourself high standards. People often tell me they don't have enough writing or creativity skills. Nonsense! You don't need to be a brilliant composer or artist. Anyone can copy the phrases [available on Postcards to the Front website, here), draw a Ukrainian flag, or use some stickers. (Defenders love getting drawings from children - you don't need to put your age! (5)). Even the simplest effort will have a big impact. The Defender will get the message: someone out there still cares about Ukraine."




And so did the russian embassy protesters (rep), following a day of protest outside the Russian Embassy! Of course! Thank you all!



Finally, a HUG THANKS to those who have donated stamps and postcard supplies. We go through a lot of pens, markers, stickers, etc.!




More cards arrive at the front line


